Coming Home for Christmas

Our Advent theme this year, *Coming Home for Christmas*, evokes a mixture of emotions for me. On the one hand, I have so many treasured memories of Christmas in my home of origin. Five kids meant a lot of anticipation throughout Advent and lots of presents to unwrap on Christmas morning. The day was filled with fun, laughter, and good food. When I became a parent, the delight of Christmas day only increased, seeing the joy and wonder in our two kids. At the same time, I've had close friends whose Christmas memories aren't nearly as cheerful. Tension-filled dinner tables or a keen awareness of who was missing around the tree made this morning less merry and bright.

I suspect that tension is always a part of Christmas. Consider the ambivalence of two of the most popular Christmas songs of all time: *I'll be Home for Christmas* and *White Christmas*, both made popular in the early 1940s by Bing Crosby. The former is written as a letter from a soldier stationed overseas during WWII, telling his family that he'll be home to see them at Christmas and hopes there will be "snow, mistletoe, and presents by the tree." It's wistful, yes, but also hopeful, at least until the last line, when you realize that duty will prevent a Christmas homecoming: "I'll be home for Christmas, if only in my dreams." The latter song, later the title track of a beloved holiday musical, also has a soulful, even mournful character as it longs for the Christmases of yesteryear. Released just a few weeks after Pearl Harbor, it was an instant sensation. But even though it was his biggest hit, Bing Crosby was reluctant to sing it on his USO tours because, as he said in an interview, "It invariably caused such a nostalgic yearning among the soldiers that it made them sad."

As I prepare for this year's Advent and Christmas, it occurs to me this ambivalence is not only natural, but perhaps right. Each and every Christmas has highs and lows for most of us, including a mixture of both joy and sorrow. Similarly, while I'm confident that we'll again have another wonderful, joy-filled Christmas celebration at Mount Olivet this year, I'm also mindful that that celebration will take place amid the ongoing war in Ukraine and the renewed violence and terror in the Middle East.

A closer look at the stories from St. Luke's Gospel that we'll read across Advent and culminating on Christmas Eve reveals the Bible is no stranger to such ambivalence. These stories are filled with the disbelief of an old man, the fear and wonder of a young woman, and take place amid the oppression occasioned by the occupation of Israel by Rome. Mary and Joseph are forced to journey far from their home at the whim of one tyrant and will soon be forced to flee their country threatened by the violence of another.

All of which reminds me that it was for just this reason that God meets us in the form of the baby Jesus, the one called Emmanuel, "God with us." Because life is at times merry and bright, and at others dark and fearful. Because each of our lives are touched by joy and sorrow, anticipation and disappointment. More than anything else, that young child, wrapped in swaddling clothes and placed in a feeding trough because there was no room in the inn, reminds us that God is committed to being with us and for us, always!

We'll prepare for this in-breaking of God's love and celebration of God's commitment to us in many ways in the coming month – through our annual Christmas Tree Lighting and Messiah Sing-A-Long on December 3, our marvelous Christmas Concert on December 10, the meaningful Services of Remembrance on December 5 (West) and December 12 (Mpls), and of course with worship services on the morning of Sunday, December 24 (one service at 10am) and throughout the afternoon and evening (2-10pm, Mpls & 2-6pm, West). Each of these celebrations – and the many you'll share with your family and friends – is an invitation to bring your whole self to Christmas, knowing that God accepts you as you are. Each is a call not to pretend that all is fine when it's not, or muster up Christmas cheer when you're sad, but rather to know that God meets you where you are – in joy, grief, and everything in between. This is the cry of the angels to those who witnessed the first Christmas, and it is the promise of the angels to those who celebrate it still: "Glory to God in the highest who comes now to bring peace and hope to all those God favors!" Including you!

Blessed Advent and Christmas!



DEVOTION

“Then Mary said, ‘Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word.’ Then the angel departed from her.” -Luke 1:38

December. I don't know of another month that carries with it so many expectations. Cookies to bake, cards to mail, presents to wrap, recitals and concerts and gatherings to host and to attend. Throw in the complications that being in relationship with other human beings brings, and well, it's a lot. Hopes and dreams, loneliness and grief, joy and sorrow.

But at its core, December means Christmas. The story of a young unmarried girl named Mary, who was told by an angel that she would bear a son, the Son of God no less, and that she was to name him Jesus. And Mary, in astounding faith, believed the angel's words. That is a miracle in itself. “Here I am,” she said. “Servant of the Lord, let it be with me according to your word.”

The Christmas story is a story of angels and a manger, shepherds and wise men and a bright star. Most of all, it is a story of God's love – of a God that loves us so very much that God sent his son, in the form of a human baby. A God that loves us so much that He wanted to know exactly what it was like to be human. To feel like we feel. To think like we think. To be worried and tempted and hungry and tired. To love and to doubt. For all our imperfections, God knows us and loves us.

Dear and gracious God, be with us this month as we scurry to and fro, trying so hard to create memories and traditions for our families. It's an impossible task, really. Help us to remember, in the midst of it all, that you love us. Exactly as we are. Remind us to be gentle with ourselves and others. Help us to begin each day of planning echoing the faith of Mary: “Here am I, the servant of the Lord, let it be with me according to your word.” Amen.

This fun and participatory event has become a special December tradition for all who love to sing the wonderful choruses from Handel's





Slow Down, Sing, and Savor Each Other

When I first arrived at Mount Olivet Conference & Retreat Center in May 2019, I wondered why every meeting room had its own piano. Two months later, one of our guest groups, the Libera Boys Choir from the United Kingdom, practiced all over our campus and then ventured out to Twin Cities' churches and community centers to share their beautiful songs. Six months after that, we welcomed 145 members of the Angelica Cantanti Youth Choir for an overnight retreat. Every Conference & Retreat Center piano accompanied and supported their choral training. I no longer wonder why we have so many pianos.

Music heals and sustains us. It improves our breathing and posture. It lowers stress and loosens tightly wound muscles. Research shows that singing, especially communal singing, releases endorphins and keeps our minds agile. It improves our mental health, as it strengthens our connections to one another. It fosters trust and cooperation with those like us and those unlike us. Participating in a choir can help mitigate social fragmentation and polarization. Coordinated singing bridges many divides, and the music created together soothes many souls.

It's not surprising to me, then, that Mount Olivet has a robust Congregational Care Department, an unmatched set of choirs and musical offerings, and affiliate ministries committed to the wellbeing of our community, e.g., the Conference & Retreat Center and Counseling Service. They each contribute to our personal and communal health! So, during this Advent season, we invite you to join us (and each other) in song. Gather your friends and family around the piano or walk the Conference & Retreat Center trails while belting out your favorite tunes. So now that there's nothing to do, what do we do?

Spilling forth from Martin Luther's rediscovery of the proclamation of justification by grace through faith – the assurance that we are saved by Christ's work alone – was a renewed articulation and focus of how God works in and through us in daily life. After all, if we don't *do* anything to earn God's love and Christ's salvation, what's all our *doing* for now?

It was (and perhaps still is) thought that "Christian" vocations were necessarily tied to the church or some specific work of proclaiming the gospel. Luther noticed instead that Christ's work set people free to focus on the neighbor, whomever and wherever one was in need. He surmised that any place or circumstance where one's life was poured out for the sake of the need and love of others was indeed *holy* work.


In the cross of Christ, Luther saw holy work located in the ordinary, lowly, and even despised places of the world, primarily in relationship to others. Christian vocation thus did not call a person away from the world rather toward the needs of the world, and even the simplest, most humble works of service could be held as holy and good. We'll also discuss how he became a key founder of the German Confessing Church in opposition to the Nationalist Socialist takeover of country, culture, and church, and his involvement with a plot to kill Hitler which led to his arrest and execution by the Nazis a mere month before the German surrender in World War II. 


MLK DAY AWAY FOR K-5TH-GRADERS!

** please note West Campus dismissal is 8pm


